HCEF is committed to empowering parents to get involved in their children's education, which is why we were thrilled to hear from Darrell, father of three boys in our afterschool program. Darrell told us about his family's story and the changes he's noticed in his kids since they started participating in HCEF's programming:

"The environment that I was around when I was under the influence of drugs and alcohol, the household was a lot different, and kinda lax on grades. But at this point, I just see a marked improvement with their overall wanting to go to school, wanting to come to the program. This program is a godsend. It allows me to make dinner, to complete some tasks I wouldn't be able to complete, and also helps them out with their education."

Beyond grade improvements, other parents and agency staff have noticed behavioral differences in afterschool students: becoming more productive, attentive, and confident; wanting to read more; and becoming better at communicating with their peers and instructors.

"I have the passion to make a difference and guide children as they grow. I want them to know that they can do it and never give up."



Learning Centers are special spaces within homeless agencies built just for

kids, equipped with technology and resources to support educational success. HCEF's Building Blocks for Success afterschool and summer programming often takes place in these learning centers, as well as Enrichment Programming like experiments with Lab Ratz Science Club or creative workshops with Art Expression, Inc.

WE ENGAGED YOUNG PEOPLE

Our programs reach a wide range of young people, from pre-K through early adulthood. The left chart shows percentages of youth served in each age category, based on a sample of 450 program participants.

Mini-Grants are available to HCEF's partners to fund innovative educational projects. Field Trips give children and families learning opportunities such as a visit to the Pittsburgh Zoo or Children's Museum. The annual Backpack Distribution supplies thousands of backpacks filled with school supplies.

WE TRAINED VOLUNTEERS

HCEF volunteers logged 10,104 hours in direct service, outreach and events, and office assistance.

The Homeless Education Network connects stakeholders in the fields of education, human services, and youth development to promote policies, resources and practices that improve educational outcomes for young people affected by homelessness.

WE EMPOWERED PROFESSIONALS

Over 400 community stakeholders participated in HEN events including the 6th Annual Summit:

- 96% reported being more knowledgeable about homeless education issues
- 95% noticed a positive impact on their work with youth
- 30% took action by adopting best practices, developing new partnerships, or writing to an elected official

WE PROMOTED SCHOOL READINESS

N EXPENDITURES THE 24 homeless housing providers and 11 schools and community organizations received over 2,400 backpacks through HCEF's annual backpack distribution program.

2015 WAS A "BREAKTHROUGH YEAR" FOR THE EDUCATION OF CHILDREN AND YOUTH EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS IN ALLEGHENY COUNTY.

Last year, HCEF reached more children and youth in Allegheny County through our direct services than in any of the previous 16 years. In addition, we have expanded our reach to identify and educate older youth experiencing homelessness, including those living on the street and unaccompanied. Five youth who experienced homelessness are now participating in post-secondary education programs with the support of our Hope Through Learning Award initiative. Our efforts were recognized by First Lady Michelle Obama through an invitation to visit the White House.

HCEF was a catalyst in forming a statewide advocacy effort to support the development of state and federal policy to address the myriad issues facing children and youth experiencing homelessness, including the December reauthorization of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act and Title I.

As an active member of the Allegheny County Department of Human Services Task Force on Unaccompanied Youth, HCEF has collaborated with foundations, law enforcement, and several other agencies to better connect homeless youth to the newly-created, county-supported drop-in center: the Auberle 412 Youth Zone. Acting as a convener and facilitator, HCEF has created a Homeless Education Network of community and government agencies to foster collaboration in addressing the unmet needs of children and youth from birth to age 24 experiencing homelessness in our region.

HCEF has accomplished all of the above without seeking or relying on the support of government funding. We are grateful for the continuous and generous financial support from our local foundations, corporations, businesses, and loyal individual donors.
