Mini-Grants for Educational Enrichment

As long-time friends of HCEF know, August is the time when we award what has been until this year called Mini-Grants for Educational Innovation. The program continues to offer our partner housing agencies this opportunity to apply for a Mini-Grant while acknowledging that *educational enrichment* is the goal of the program.

Grants of up to \$2000 were awarded August 12, 2011, to 13 partners in service: Alle-Kiski Area Hope Shelter, Alle-Kiski Hope Center Transitional, Crisis Center North, Healthy Start House, HEARTH, Primary Care Supportive Housing – Open Arms and San Kofa House, The Salvation Army Family Caring Center, Sisters Place, Sojourner House, Sojourner House MOMS, Woman Space East, Womansplace, Women's Center and Shelter.

On average,

- 500 children and 150 youths benefit from HCEF Mini-Grants each year
- 150 children and 70 parents participate in HCEF-funded field trips each year
- 4000 children and youths have benefited from HCEF Mini-Grants since 2004.

These grants are funded entirely by the financial contributions of individual donors in Pittsburgh and Allegheny County as well as such donors from across the Commonwealth and the nation. Not one penny goes to HCEF operations.

Gear for Grades 2011

Monday, August 16, was backpack delivery day for HCEF. Over 2000 backpacks were delivered to homeless residential housing agencies on this day, with hundreds more available for children and youth new in supportive housing at any time during the coming school year. HCEF has partnered with Citizens Bank for several years, with the bank purchasing the thousands of backpacks and inviting donations of required school supplies through its area branch offices.

Pittsburgh Gives: October 4



The Pittsburgh Foundation will hold its 2011 Day of Giving Tuesday, October 4, 2011, from 12:00 a.m. until 11:59:59 p.m. All donations made to the Homeless Children's Education Fund during that 24-hour period will receive a pro-rated portion of the match pool. (If, for example, the match pool is \$500,000 and the *total* amount raised that day is \$2,000,000, then your donation to HCEF will receive a match of \$.25 cents on the dollar.)

Only MasterCard and Visa donations received through www.pittsburghgives.org during the 24 hours of October 4 will be matched for this event and no donations by check, cash, or stock will be accepted.

The minimum gift is \$25. The maximum gift an individual can give per organization is \$10,000. Note: On October 4 the Pittsburgh Gives Donate page will not be accessible until 12:00 a.m.

Auberle Movin'On

HCEF and Auberle staff and clients celebrated the opening of an HCEF computerized Learning Center in the *Movin'On* transitional housing facility in Duquesne, Pennsylvania.



The facility serves boys 16-21 who are in homeless situations or at risk of becoming homeless.

Up to ten clients can be served at any one time and they can participate in the program for up to 24 months or to the age of 21, whichever comes first. The clients participated in remaking the space that now houses the center.

The Learning Center was made possible by the Nathan Minoski Memorial Fund through The Pittsburgh Foundation. As Kevin Jenkins, Director of the Community Initiatives/Senior Program Officer at the foundation, said, "When two social service organizations work together, the outcome can only be great."


And coming this fall . . .


