Dear Friends,

2019 was a milestone year as we celebrated 20 years of empowering kids to break the cycle of homelessness through education and the retirement and transition of our founder Dr. Joe Lagana from our board and day to day activities. We are thankful for his vision, leadership and dedication to unstably -housed youth. It is our honor to move things forward.

This year, HCEF provided education and enrichment support to over 800 youth in our programs. Providing young people with diverse STEM and arts opportunities, career coaching and learning experiences as well as giving them tools to improve their mental health. For our teens, we provided coaching and support to maintain grade level, graduate and move on to college or career options.

Additionally, we provided over \$25,000 in college scholarship awards and equipped thousands of students with back packs to provide them the tools they need to start school. One mother shared with us that she was "no longer ashamed of not having school supplies for my children!" Testimonies like that are reassuring and remind us that **the support of donors like you is making an impact.** We continue to focus on youth's social and emotional learning in our shelter and high school programs and were proud to launch a partnership with Steel Valley High School and Dr. Carla Chugani (University of Pittsburgh) to help our students better manage and regulate behavior, mitigate stress and reduce suicides — as young people experiencing homelessness are 6 times more likely to commit suicide.

We also were privileged to be recognized by the Rotary Club of Pittsburgh as an inaugural award recipient of the Community Resource: Rotary Ethics Excellence Award, for our commitment to serving the community with equity and integrity.

None of this is possible without the support of faithful donors like you. In light of the COVID-19 crisis, students experiencing homelessness need us more than ever. This crisis has impacted all of us, but families experiencing homelessness are impacted to a greater extent as they are already struggling to stay afloat. HCEF is willing to stand in the gap with your support. I am hopeful that we will get through this time that continues to reveal the best of humanity.

Your continued belief in our mission and in the youth we serve makes an impact. Thank you.

Student Stories of STRENGTH, HOPE +HEART

MEET: TORRELL



At 5 years old, Torrell entered HCEF's afterschool program under a lot of stress, having trouble processing his emotions healthily, holding attention, and following a routine. His formal schooling up until that point had been inconsistent, and he couldn't write all of the letters in his name.

Our instructors & volunteers worked closely with Torrell to help him map out his schedule on a visual chart and teach him how to verbalize his emotions using a facial expression chart. They also collaborated with his mother and school to get him special education supports he desperately needed and enrolled him in an extended school year program.

By the time Torrell entered first grade, he had visibly progressed in so many ways, and was excited to come to the afterschool program every day. He could spell his name, sound out certain words, and he was always eager to get his homework done before he ate his snack. It was so gratifying to see that Torrell had learned to trust-both himself and others. He walked away from the program more confident, and with many of the tools he needed to succeed in school and life.

MEET: MONIKA

Monika met HCEF in September as a sophomore in high school when her family had lost their home. Their situation was dire. Her mother had to be on bed rest after a complicated pregnancy. With a job that did not provide paid sick leave, however, she was let go, and their financial situation was grim.

Despite this traumatic experience, Monika remains resilient, focused and career-driven. She already knows she wants to go to law school. She is eager to learn, reading free law books online, while saving up money working at Walmart. Recently, our Teen Program Manager set up an online mentoring session with Anthony DeLuca, a local attorney, who gave her college and career advice. HCEF also connected her with free online courses that she can take from Ivy League Universities, which she is excited to begin in her free time. Now moving into her junior year, Monika will have our continued assistance to select a great school, and tap into the best scholarships.

We honored Karina Chavez as our Champion for Children, and we raised over \$100,000 for our kids and teens.






KIDS AT SOJOURNER HOUSE MOMS RECEIVED A COMPLETELY REMODELED LEARNING CENTER!


